October Meeting In Review

Laurie Hashizume and Eric Roberts led an interesting discussion on the considerations in commission and consignment work, with additional experiences shared by guild members. Both Laurie and Eric told of examples of when commission work has been beneficial for them and when it has not. Both emphasized the need for clarity between the artist/artisan and the client both on the visual and technical expectations (e.g. how many cups of water a tea pot holds) and cost. It was recommended that terms be discussed in advance, such as whether any deposit is refundable or not. Some felt that even if the piece is not accepted (assuming there are no technical flaws), the deposit should be retained for the effort invested, as it is not known if another buyer will be found for the completed piece. Eric also advised that he would not undertake a commissioned piece using new to him glazes and that he only works with glazes he is familiar with and knows how they will perform. Laurie talked about enjoying the technical process of working with a client to develop glaze concepts and create the appropriate glaze. Laurie suggests providing details about yourself and your work to any shop which will be selling your work, AND requesting right of approval for any additional information the shop wants to use for marketing. Both Eric and Laurie concluded that there can be great advantages to commissioned work as long as it fits your 'comfort zone'.

Guild Programs

As the members know, Rosemary Neering has stepped down after many years as program chair and we are a bit at loose ends right now for a lead on the organization of the programs – several have volunteered at the September meeting to help with the organization and there were lots of good ideas for the programs offered up at the October meeting (i.e. demonstration of the many ways Guild members use extruders, demonstration of the pots collected by members from around the world) and for now, someone is sorting out the November meeting plans and the back up plans (you always need back up plans, weather dependent etc.) **But....**so far no one has leapt up to say they will be responsible for the organization of the programs from month to month and will give the updates to the newsletter and the membership distribution person. Rosemary estimates it is at best a one hour effort per month getting things sorted. Most members come to meetings because of the programs, so the continued success of the Guild is in part dependent on this important role. So it would be great if one of the members felt they could take this on for just the remainder of this year and see how it goes. The Crafted Dish and the Guild's Own Cindy Gibson

So what's the Crafted Dish you say and how is it related to guild member Cindy Gibson?

The Crafted Dish is a one of kind brand new (released on October 9, 2017) book that combines the amazing talents of 61 CANADIAN Ceramic Artists (that deserves to be capitalized) and it's a cook book too. As described on the webpage "What do you get when you ask Canadian ceramic artists if they want to be a part of a different type of cookbook: one that mashes up amazing family recipes with gorgeous handmade dishes? You get THE CRAFTED DISH which, in our humble opinion is something pretty unique and awesome." The cook book combines photographs of pottery in use with recipes of the featured artists' favorite foods to celebrate using handmade in daily life. The release of the book coincided with the second annual National Clay Week.



When I started down the path of chatting with Cindy to learn about her role in the creation of this book, I didn't know what a deeply interesting and complex story I was about to hear. To give you a glimmer of the depth of this topic, I sat down this evening to sketch out the outline for this article two hours ago, and I'm still lost in the fascinating reading of the blurbs and blogs and webpages of the various people who led the project. I had not heard of the National Clay Week, nor Carole Epp's blog or role in the website http://www.makeanddo.ca/about nor Tales of a Red Clay Rambler http://www.talesofaredclayrambler.com, all of which I am finding out about (I didn't know I was living under a rock, clay wise).

So, let's see if I can give you a thumbnail sketch of what I've learned from Cindy and from my readings.

Carole Epp (CarolEpp.com) is a dynamic Saskatchewan clay artist, who has been blogging for more than 10 years about all things clay (MusingaboutMud.com) and who is a member of the 'Make and Do' website http://www.makeanddo.ca/about which is a collective of 9 ceramic artists from across Canada. Carole is regularly featured on the podcast of the Tales of a Red Clay Rambler and was recently interviewed for the program on October 5, 2017 about the Crafted Dish release, a project she led with a lot of help, financial and otherwise from the National Clay Week. National Clay Week (www.NationalClayWeek.org) is a little more difficult to explain, as I'm just getting a glimmer of its reach from browsing their webpage. So, what I know so far – it's new, it started in 2016, there are two co-founders (one of which is Stephen Creech, a potter who also the director of marketing for Amaco Brent), they use social media to bring together a wide representation of clay artists around the notion of a week that celebrates clay, community and creativity. The two completed National Clay Weeks (October 10-14, 2016 and October 9-15, 2017) included online directories of open studios across the United States posted on the website as well as daily events involving a wide array of potters from other countries through online streaming. One of the 2017 daily themes was "Using Handmade" and included promotion of the launch of The Crafted Dish.

Brainchild of Carole Epp, the Crafted Dish aims to promote Canadian ceramics and makers with beautiful photographs of handmade pottery being used in everyday life. Production of the Crafted Dish was made possible entirely through donated services including the photography of the dishes, the recipes, essays, jurying, graphic design and marketing. Proceeds from the sale of The Crafted Dish are being donated to The Stop Community Food Centre, which has a mission of striving to

increase access to healthy food in a manner that maintains dignity, builds health and community, and challenges inequality. Lots of great information about this Toronto organization at http://thestop.org/.

Now, how does Cindy Gibson fit into this? Many of you will know Cindy and her work through her participation in the Guild and her various Guild program presentations, including the program of a year or two ago in which she described how she was hired as a production potter in Germany (the interview for the job included throwing 100 mugs to exact standards in the morning and attaching handles the same afternoon). Cindy has been a full time, self-supporting potter for almost four decades, including time spent as mentioned in Germany and also in England selling her work through galleries. Since returning to Canada some years ago, Cindy's primary focus for marketing her work has been through shows, as well as in more recent years, through her website. She is constantly musing about the process of marketing her work and looking to



reduce the physical effort needed to support multiple yearly shows (a lot of packing up and hoisting things about as we all know). It was in researching on-line opportunities to drive more viewers to her own website that she rather reluctantly joined Twitter, Instagram, and Google. While they, as well as Facebook have all been successful to a certain extent, Instagram has proved to be the most effective in connecting Cindy to other ceramic artists. It was through IG that Cindy became aware of Carole Epp.... and on her IG feed was the "call to enter" for The Crafted Dish.



There were of course a variety of requirements for the submissions. The project looked appealing but the timeline was very short. This meant using an existing piece of her work and deciding what recipe to submit – which as well as being a family favourite was informed by the abundance of rhubarb in the garden. It meant that in the short time, the recipe needed to be made and the results photographed by herself using her trusty smartphone and then getting the submission in minutes after midnight of the day submissions closed. It seems a tight submission was a common experience for the other artists as the timeline was extended a week. It's probably true of virtually all

human endeavors but it seems that anything clay means working at a frantic pace on what the outside world sees as a calm and restful process that is now being linked to mindfulness. There were over a hundred submissions for the book (bodes well for Canadian ceramic work), so the Guild can all share a bit in the reflected glory that one of ours was selected by the jurors in the final sixty-one. I'm looking forward to my copy arriving – those interested in ordering a copy (Christmas presents anyone???) might want to band together in the hopes of better shipping rates.

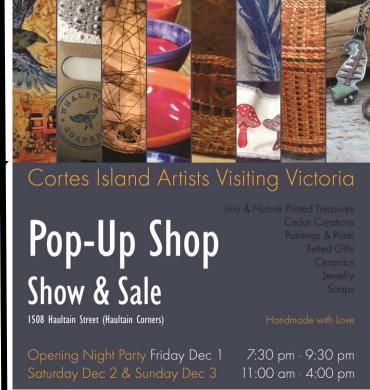


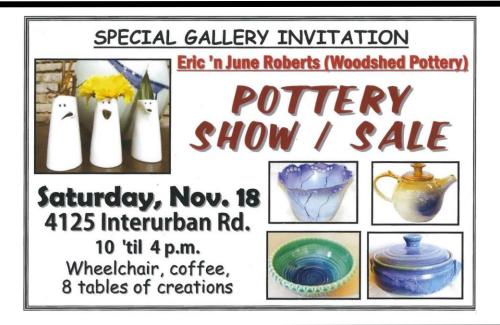

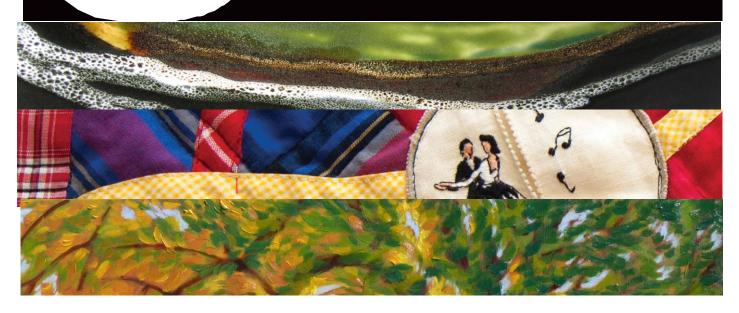
