
June's Meeting – Swap and Nosh




Making Patterned Coloured Clay with Piteka at MISSA

Vince [Pitelka] gave excellent one-on-one attention to the 9 participants, provided detailed notes and showed some wonderful slides of pottery by various artists working in this style. Some of my favorite's were by C. Benzle, T. Hoadley, M. Haley & S. Siegele, D. Feibleman and C. Campbell.

We began by wedging Mason stains (primary colors + black, brown) into 5 pound blocks of white clay and learned how to make a "Veneer Slicer" that could be adjusted for thicknesses - from 1/32" to 1/2" (our course fees covered one to take home, made by Vince). Each day we made a couple of loaves, using Vince's patterns with names like woodgrain, feather-comb, brick wall, herringbone, polka-dot, parquet and granite.

Once the loaves were complete we sliced off thin veneers (cross-section) to attach to a large thin slab using a spritz of vinegar water. From the slabs we could make simple footed trays (using hump molds), lidded boxes, etc. Or to apply pieces of veneer to leather-hard thrown pieces (i.e. vases, tumblers) we used plastic-wrap on one side while placing and rolling in place with a small brayer.

Once pieces are dried (very slowly) and bisque fired, a clear glaze can be used for functional ware, or for decorative items a light sanding might be preferred. Of course we were encouraged to create our own colored loaf designs and investigate new way and unconventional ways to use colored clay.

The studio is left much as it had been when Bernard was in charge. His tools are set out on the bench, his books line the shelf and only the fireplace needs to be lit. At the end of each work day he would meet with his fellow potters around that fireplace to discuss the firing, the pots, all things esoteric, aesthetic, and mundane.







. There are three kilns, the 'climbing' three chamber kiln once burned wood then oil, a gas kiln and last an electric. The leach wheel is there. grinders, mixers and mills all things expected.

Pottery on the Oregon Coast

Headed down the Oregon coast in mid-May and, as always, looking for interesting pottery, especially hand-built. Cannon Beach is a disappointment, nothing open and nothing very intriguing as we peer through shop windows. South again, we decide to stay in Lincoln City for no particular reason except that it is Friday night and a beautiful weekend coming up: time to find a motel.

And pick up a local tourist publication that mentions Mossy Creek Pottery. Yes, they are open, every day of the year except Christmas and Thanksgiving, so we check in, and head the few kilometres south to Gleneden Beach.

Mossy Creek is hidden away in a funky building with a lovely garden up a side road east of the coast road by Siletz Bay. They have been there for 40 years; they show the works of some 45 potters including owner and resident potter Dan Wheeler. Lots of wheel-thrown work, but what catches my eye is the handbuilt stuff: brilliantly coloured vases in stunning blues and reds, plates and sushi trays and garlic graters textured with lava rock, and much more. Further south a few days later, we find the new Earthworks Gallery on Newport's main street. Earthworks has another gallery in Yachats: I can't decide which one I like better.
